Expanding by Leaps and Bounds!

Jewish Studies is growing beyond anyone's expectations. We added [9 new courses](#) to the minor this year, and we will be adding a tenth course next year. For the second time in the program's 4-year history, I took students, faculty, and some of their family members to Israel, this time focusing on Holy Land pilgrimage (see [SMU in Israel](#)).

Our community programs continued to draw students and life-long learners alike. The fall Nate and Ann **Levine Lecture** welcomed co-authors Doron Ben-Atar (Professor of History, Fordham University) and Andrew Pessin (Professor of Philosophy, Connecticut College and antisemitism editor for the global Jewish newspaper *algemeiner*) who addressed the topic of their book, "Israel, BDS, and Campus Life: Complexities of Jewish Identity in the American Academy." The spring Levine Lecture at the fourth annual One Day Jewish University brought Lisa Gossels, director of the award-winning documentary film, *My So Called Enemy*, who discussed the process of filming and editing a seven-year longitudinal study of Israeli and Palestinian girls who attended a cross-cultural women's leadership program called *Building Bridges for Peace*. The film was deeply poignant, and Ms. Gossel's stories were compelling and thought-provoking.

January's celebration of **International Ladino Day** included reflections by members of the Ladino community and a rousing concert by Michelle Alany and friends. The North Texas Council of Jewish Studies Professors, which I chair, co-sponsored the first undergraduate [North Texas Jewish Studies Conference](#) with the University of Dallas. The keynote speaker, Prof. Sharon Portnoff, Director of Jewish Studies and Elie Wiesel Associate Professor of Judaic Studies at Connecticut College addressed "On Primo Levi's 'Dignifying Holocaust Witnessing,'" which demonstrated how Levi employed Dante's structure of the *Inferno* to create his Holocaust poem "Reveille."

Last, but most definitely not least, we graduated 5 minors this Spring (see **Student Spotlight**) and look forward to adding one more this Fall.

We look forward to continued success as we disperse for the summer and plan for next year.

Fall '18 Levine Lecture: Campus Anti-Zionism and Antisemitism

Doron Ben-Atar, Professor of History, Fordham University, and Andrew Pessin, Professor of Philosophy at Connecticut College and antisemitism editor for the global Jewish newspaper *algemeiner*, addressed the topic of their book, "Israel, BDS, and Campus Life: Complexities of Jewish Identity in the American Academy." They traced the rise of on-campus protests against Israel and the increasing intimidation of Jewish faculty and students across American colleges and universities, both of which they demonstrated often crossed the line from civil, reasoned political disagreement to antisemitism. While Pessin and Ben-Atar situate themselves on different ends of the political spectrum, they agreed that the current environment on many campuses was hostile to Jewish self-expression.



Spring '19 Levine Lecture: Making the Film *My So-Called Enemy*



Lisa Gossels, director, producer & Emmy® Award-winning documentary filmmaker ("The Children of Chabannes" & "My So-Called Enemy") discussed her experience documenting six Palestinian and Israeli teenage girls committed to justice and mutual understanding after participating in a cross-cultural women's leadership program called *Building Bridges for Peace*. The film explores how the young women's transformative experience of knowing their "enemies" as human beings in a U.S. retreat meets with the complicated realities of their lives back home in the Middle East. Through their coming-of-age narratives, audiences see the challenges of creating relationships across political, racial, religious, cultural and physical divides as well as the possibility and hope that come from listening to each other's stories. The event was co-sponsored by the Women's and Gender Studies program and the Perkins School of Theology.

Guest Lecture Explores Israeli Democracy

Reuven Hazan, Professor of Political Science at Hebrew University, outlined the ways the Israeli parliamentary system fulfills its democratic objectives and how it might improve. After giving a lucid explanation of how the election and governance system works, he presented an argument for direct election of the prime minister, claiming it would diminish the disproportionate influence as well as the number of Israel's minority parties. The event was co-sponsored with the Southwest Jewish Congress.



SMU in Israel: Focus on Pilgrims

For spring break 2019, students traveled with Drs. Stephanie Amsel (English), Denise DuPont (Spanish), Catherine Keene (Medieval Studies), Abbey Stockstill (Art History), Shira Lander (Jewish Studies), and Bonnie Wheeler (Medieval Studies) to visit and study sites with centuries-long historical significance to pilgrims of Jewish, Christian, and Muslim backgrounds. The trip examined both continuities and discontinuities of locations and stories visited by religious travelers to the Holy Land. We studied the many layers of narrative traditions as well as of physical landmarks that dot the contested landscape considered holy by the three Abrahamic religions.



ONE DAY JEWISH UNIVERSITY @ SMU

This year's One Day Jewish University welcomed a new SMU professor to the event, **Yoram Solomon**, from the Cox School of Business, who specializes in innovation culture and entrepreneurship. He and his colleague, Prof. Simon Mak, taught "Innovation in Israel: From Blockchain and Beyond" (blockchain is a cryptography tool used to secure digital data). Other courses included "The Golden Age of Jewish Women? Mrs. Maisel, Rebecca Bunch, and RBG," "Jewish and Christian Views of the Messiah," "Wellhausen's Folly: Why Historical-Critical Study of the Bible Is a Waste of Time," and "Conflicting Narratives Among 'Holy Land' Pilgrim Guides." The student turnout surpassed previous years, with over 40 undergraduates attending the event.

SMUJS Faculty Highlights

Mark A. Chancey, Professor of Religious Studies, is continuing to research his next book, *The Good Book as Textbook: Bible Courses in American Public Schools*.

Richard W. Cogley, Associate Professor of Religious Studies, was awarded the 2019 Perrine Prize for embodying the ideals of Phi Beta Kappa and its tradition of excellence.

Erin R. Hochman, Associate Professor of History, won the Hans Rosenberg Best 2016 Book Prize by the Central European History Society and the 2017 Radomir Luža Prize by the American Friends of the Documentation Center of Austrian Resistance, Vienna and the Center Austria at the University of New Orleans for her outstanding publication on Central European studies in the era of the Second World War, *Imagining a Greater Germany: Republican Nationalism and the Idea of Anschluss* (Cornell University Press, 2016).

Shira L. Lander, Senior Lecturer in Religious Studies, delivered a talk "Holy Land or Land of the Holy?: The Significance of Jerusalem to Jews, Christians, and Muslims" at the 2019 *Tables of Content* fundraiser for the Friends of the SMU Libraries.

Martha Satz, Assistant Professor of English, delivered the paper "Literary Re-victimization in the Wake of the Holocaust: An Ethical Consideration of Problematic Post-Holocaust Novels" at the Annual Scholars Conference on the Holocaust and the Churches at UTD, and was a respondent at the Association of Jewish Studies meeting in Boston.

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
