



EVERETT KORNEGAY

Everett Kornegay was a student in S. M. U. the year the University opened. He was well-known to all the students because of his work in the library. He returned in 1916 and was working on his B. D. and M. A. when the United States declared war. He waived his exemption claim as a student for the ministry and enlisted in the Marines. He was killed "in Flanders Fields" the day before the armistice was signed.

ROY MONROE BURSON

Roy Burson, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Burson, of Alvord, Texas, was a member of the Freshman Class of 1919, and a member of the S. A. T. C. unit of S. M. U. Just before the demobilization of the S. A. T. C. Roy became ill of influenza, and died on November 26th, 1918.

BAXTER CARLYLE DUNCAN

Baxter Duncan was a member of the first Freshman Class in S. M. U., and was elected Class President in the Spring Term. He was a member of Chi Rho Delta Fraternity. He enlisted in the Marines in 1917, and in September, 1918, word was received that he had been killed in action in Argonne Forest on the 12th of that month. A fellow soldier, asked by the family to investigate concerning Baxter, was unable to locate his grave.

DUDLEY W. AYERS

Dudley W. Ayres, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Ayers, of Terrell, Texas, died of pneumonia at Southern Methodist University on December 12, 1918. Dudley was twenty years of age. He graduated from Kaufman High School in 1917 and took his Freshman work at A. & M. College. In the Fall of 1918 he entered Southern Methodist University as a Sophomore and a member of the S. A. T. C.
